

ADD ONE/EYEWITNESS: A VIEW FROM SPACE

Professor Moore served as a committee member of the NASA Space and Earth Science Advisory Committee, a member of the NASA Advisory Council, and chairman of NASA's senior science advisory panel. Upon completion of his Chairmanship, Professor Moore was presented with NASA's highest civilian award, the NASA Distinguished Public Service Medal for outstanding service to the agency.

Greg Olsen was the third private citizen to orbit the earth on the International Space Station (ISS). He performed more than 150 orbits of the earth and logged almost 4 million miles of weightless travel during his 10 days in space. After a career as a research scientist and entrepreneur, Olsen is now president of GHO Ventures in Princeton, NJ.

Moderating the discussion will be Derrick Pitts, who has been associated with the Franklin Institute Science Museum since 1978, designing and presenting many of the museum's public programs and exhibits. Among his many awards are the Mayor's Liberty Bell Award in May 1990; the distinguished Alumni Award, 1994, from St. Lawrence University; the George Washington Carver Medal in March, 1995; and, in 1998, the Please Touch Museum's "Great Friend To Kids" Award. Eyewitness: The View from Space is being held in conjunction with the Center's summer exhibition, *Eyewitness: American Originals from the National Archives*. The exhibit features a transcript and audio-visual excerpts of a televised message from the crew of Apollo 8 while in lunar orbit from December 24, 1968.

From May 25 through September 3, 2007 the National Constitution Center is hosting *Eyewitness: American Originals from the National Archives*. The exhibition presents first-hand accounts of watershed events in American history. Through letters, diaries, photographs, and audio and film recordings from the National Archives and its Presidential Libraries, visitors to the *Eyewitness* exhibition will gain new and unique insights into well-known occurrences.

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Eyewitness: American Originals from the National Archives is free with regular museum admission of \$12 for adults, \$11 for seniors ages 65 and up, and \$8 for children ages 4-12.
