## **STUDENTS DELIBERATE THE QUESTION: *SHOULD THE UNITED STATES REDUCE IMMIGRATION?* DURING “THE EXCHANGE” AT THE NATIONAL CONSTITUTION CENTER**

### ***Planet Green Network’s SuChin Pak to Host; Live Internet Broadcast Available***

Philadelphia, PA (September 4, 2009) – The National Constitution Center, with generous support from the Annenberg Foundation, will kick off the 2009-2010 season of *The Exchange* with a roundtable conversation on immigration in the United States on Friday, September 25, from 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. EST. Students from schools across the country will discuss whether or not the United States should reduce immigration. SuChin Pak, of “G Word” on the Planet Green Network, will host.

During this installment of *The Exchange*, students will examine current legislation concerning immigration, and the contentious issues surrounding immigration reform, including whether unauthorized immigrants should be offered a “pathway to citizenship.” Participants will also discuss the exploitation of immigrant workers, immigration’s effects on wages, and border security, in order to devise a plan for the future of immigration in the United States.

Students will participate in the deliberation both at the Center and via video conference. Any school in the country can view a live broadcast of the event at [www.constitutioncenter.org/exchange](http://www.constitutioncenter.org/exchange), where curricular material to support classroom discussion of the topic is also available.

Prior to *The Exchange*, participating schools will receive a curriculum poster developed by the education staff at the Center to encourage students to examine and evaluate the issue of immigration from a variety of perspectives. The front side of the poster is designed to initiate student conversation with a Town Hall Wall, a format pioneered at the Center and

used in its permanent exhibition, which presents the basics of an issue and various options for its resolution. The opposite side of the poster, created for teachers, displays the curriculum, including lesson plans and student handouts.

**SuChin Pak** returning to *The Exchange* for the 6<sup>th</sup> installment, is the host of “G Word,” a daily news series about innovation in the environmental space, on the Planet Green Network. Prior to joining the Planet Green Network, Pak served as an MTV News correspondent. While part of the MTV news team, she co-hosted MTV’s pre-Grammy show and covered the MTV Video Music Awards, the MTV Movie Awards, and the Sundance Film Festival. Pak was also an integral part of MTV’s 2004 *Choose or Lose* Campaign, which sought to encourage young people to vote. In addition, she covered the September 11<sup>th</sup> tragedy, contributing segments about young volunteers and Muslim-American women. In 2005, Pak traveled to Thailand to cover the aftermath of the tsunami. Following Hurricane Katrina, she visited Baton Rouge to report on college students at Louisiana State University who aided rescue and recovery efforts. Born in Korea, Pak and her family moved to the Bay Area when she was five years old. She graduated from the University of California, Berkeley, with a degree in political science.

The scholarly advisor and moderator for this edition of *The Exchange* is **Dr. J. Michael Hogan**, co-director of the Center for Democratic Deliberation of Pennsylvania State University. Hogan’s research interests include political campaigns and social movements, foreign policy debates, presidential rhetoric, and public opinion and polling. He is the author of three books, *The Panama Canal in American Politics*, *The Nuclear Freeze Campaign*, and *Woodrow Wilson’s Western Tour*. Hogan has served on the editorial board of the *Quarterly Journal of Speech*, and he currently serves on the editorial board of *Rhetoric and Public Affairs*. He holds a master’s degree and a doctorate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Each installment of *The Exchange* is designed to stimulate dialogue among students about a current constitutional issue. Previous *Exchange* programs have focused on topics such as religious expression in schools, school violence, and the balance of school safety and students’ constitutional rights. During the most recent *Exchange* program, students discussed the idea of a
